



Did you know that October is Respect Life Month? The theme of Respect Life Month 2025 is "Life: Our Sign of Hope." Resources have been developed to assist all parishioners understand and value the gift of human life and become engaged with building a culture that cherishes every human life:

- Interactive Respect Life Bulletin Boards are located in the church narthex. Please take a
  moment to check them out, add your own pro-life intentions to the board and
  encourage other parishioners to add their prayers and material to the boards that
  illustrate the gift of all human life.
- 40 Days for Life continues through November 2, 2025. Mid-point Candlelight Vigil at Glendale Planned Parenthood is scheduled for Friday, October 17.
- Respect Life Month Novena begins on Wednesday, October 22 through Thursday, October 30, 2025. Sign up and get daily prayers, reflections and more at www.respectlife.org.

Did you know that the Respect Life Ministry will be hosting a presentation by Fr. Estevan Wetzel, the Director of Prison Ministry from the Diocese? Ministry members reflected on the Gospel passage in Matthew 25:36 "I was <u>naked</u> and you clothed me. I was ill and you comforted me, in prison and you came to visit me." Our parish demographic mainly consists of retirees and elderly. It would be difficult, but not impossible, to accomplish all that would be required to physically visit the incarcerated. But one thing that most ministry and parish members are able to do is write letters and send cards. "Cards for the Incarcerated" is a new project for the Respect Life Ministry that is open to all parishioners. Fr. Wetzel will speak on the "dos and don'ts" in respect to communication with those currently imprisoned. The presentation will take place the afternoon of November 8, 2025, 2 pm to 3 pm in Madonna Hall. ## How to Build a Culture of Life

#### THE PROBLEM

Watching the news and reading the headlines, we may feel helpless seeing the heartbreaking lack of respect for human life. How do we respond when our efforts seem small in the face of the culture of death? MISSIONARY DISCIPLESHIP

#### **OUR CHRISTIAN IDENTITY**

To understand more fully how to defend and protect human life, we must first consider who we are, at the deepest level. God creates us in his image and likeness, which means we are made to be in loving relationship with him. The essence of our identity and worth, the source of our dignity, is that we are loved by God: "We are not the sum of our weaknesses and failures; we are the sum of the Father's love for us and our real capacity to become the image of his Son."1

We are called to divine intimacy, true communion with God, and we can grow in this closeness with him through daily prayer, reading the Scriptures, and frequent participation in the sacraments, especially Confession and the Eucharist.

#### **OUR MISSION AS CHRISTIANS**

The knowledge and realization of how deeply we are loved by God elicits a response of love that simultaneously draws us closer to God and, at the same time, impels us to share his love with others.

Embracing a relationship with God means following in his footsteps, wherever he may call. Just as Jesus invited St. Peter and St. Andrew to become his disciples, he invites us to do the same: "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:19).

Being a disciple of Jesus naturally includes sharing the Gospel with others and inviting them into a deeper relationship with God. As Christians, our identity and our mission are two sides of the same coin; like the apostles, we are called to be missionary disciples.

This doesn't necessarily mean quitting our jobs or moving to foreign countries. For most of us, our mission field is daily life: "Christ teaches us how to evangelize, how to invite people into communion with him, and how to create a culture of witness: namely, through love. A Christian life lived with charity and faith is the most effective form of evangelization."2

The first step towards living this life is allowing Jesus to meet and transform us daily. If we respond to his grace, our lives will show we have something beyond what the world offers: we follow a person whose love changes our lives, so we want others to also experience his transforming love.

When we live in union with God, open to his prompting, we're more able to see the opportunities for witness and his guidance in responding to these opportunities. We may fear doing the wrong thing or saying the wrong thing, but we do not need to be afraid. Jesus promised his disciples, "I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

#### **IDENTITY CRISIS**

As a society and as individuals, we often measure ourselves by false standards: by what and how much we do, our successes or failures, how others treat us, the degree of our pleasure or independence, etc. And when these changeable substitutes prove to be insufficient, or when we are faced with challenges and suffering, we may feel helpless, alone, or abandoned; we may be tempted to feel as though our lives have decreased value or worth.

But God's love—individual, real, unchanging—is the true source of our worth, identity, and dignity. It really is not a question of who we are, but rather *whose* we are. Because his love will never change, nothing can reduce our Godgiven dignity, and nothing can diminish the immeasurable worth of our lives.

#### **OUR RESPONSE**

When someone is facing great trials, we need to meet them where they are, walk with them on their journey, intercede for them, and be open to sharing Christ's love however he directs.

When a woman becomes pregnant, and her boyfriend threatens to leave if she continues the pregnancy, we need to lovingly walk with her. When family members or friends become seriously ill, we need to assure them that God still offers them something in this life, and they still have purpose. We need to consistently be with them every step of the way.

Sometimes our actions speak for themselves; other times, words are needed. Whatever the situation, Jesus knows

how to speak to each person's heart; we simply need to follow where he leads.

#### A CULTURE OF LIFE

This is how we answer our missionary call. This is how we build a culture of life, a culture that joyfully proclaims the truth of God's love, purpose, and plan for each person. Changing the culture is a process of conversion that begins in our own hearts and includes a willingness to be instructed and a desire to be close to Jesus—the source of joy and love.

When we encounter Christ, experience his love, and deepen our relationship with him, we become more aware of our own worth and that of others. His love for each person is cause for great joy, and growing understanding of this priceless treasure motivates us to share his love with others. Our lives are often changed by the witness of others; so too, others' lives may be changed by our witness and authentic friendship with them.

Let us go, therefore, and not be afraid. God is always with us.

#### Feast of Saint Ignatius of Antioch

On October 17, the Church honors Saint Ignatius of Antioch, one of the earliest and most courageous bishops of the Christian faith. Born around the year 35, Ignatius was the third bishop of Antioch, following Saint Peter and Saint Evodius. He led his community during a time of persecution and is remembered for his deep love of Christ and the Church.

Ignatius is best known for his letters, written while he was being taken to Rome to face martyrdom around the year 107. These letters to various Christian communities remain among the most valuable writings from the early Church. They express his clear understanding of the faith, his devotion to the Eucharist, and his strong defense of unity under the authority of the bishop.

He is the patron saint of the Church in the Eastern Mediterranean and of those who serve in church leadership. His writings often use the phrase "the Catholic Church," making him the first known person to describe the Church with that name. For Ignatius, the Church was not an idea but a living body united in Christ through the Eucharist.

Ignatius accepted suffering as the path that would bring him closer to Christ. He wrote, "I am God's wheat, and I am to be ground by the teeth of wild beasts that I may be found pure bread of Christ." His courage in facing death inspired generations of Christians to hold firm in faith during persecution.

From his life, we learn three clear lessons.

- Stay united in the Church. Faith is strongest when believers stand together under their shepherds.
- Cherish the Eucharist. It is the true presence of Christ that gives life to the community.
- Remain faithful even in hardship. True discipleship often requires endurance and trust in God's will.

Saint Ignatius of Antioch reminds us that faith is not theory but witness. His words and example continue to strengthen the Church he served with such love. As we honor him, let us renew our commitment to unity, fidelity, and courage in following Christ.

Through his intercession, may our parish grow in faith and charity, and may our lives reflect the same burning devotion that guided Saint Ignatius of Antioch to the fullness of eternal life.

## TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

ALTHOUGH THE HOURS OF DAYLIGHT ARE RAPIDLY DWINDLING, MANY PEOPLE WOULD SAY THAT THESE OCTOBER DAYS BRING THE YEAR'S MOST SPLENDID WEATHER. AMERICANS ARE RIDERS AND JOGGERS, NOT STROLLERS, AND SO THE PLEASURES OF THE SEASON ARE OFTEN LOST ON US. THIS IS NOT THE CASE WITH MANY JEWISH PEOPLE, WHO OBSERVE AN ANCIENT RULE IN WALKING TO SYNAGOGUE ON THE SABBATH. ON CITY STREETS AND SUBURBAN SIDEWALKS IN MANY CITIES, WE MAY NOTICE AROUND SUNSET THE NICELY DRESSED FAMILIES WALKING AND CHATTING ON FRIDAY AFTERNOON. AFTER A SHORT PRAYER AT DUSK, THE FAMILIES STROLL HOME AGAIN FOR A RELAXING AND FESTIVE MEAL. THEY RETURN TO SYNAGOGUE IN THE MORNING, AND THEN SPEND AN AFTERNOON IN FAMILY LEISURE UNTIL THREE STARS APPEAR IN THE NIGHT SKY AND SABBATH ENDS.

CATHOLICS, ON THE OTHER HAND, PILE INTO THE CAR AND DRIVE EVEN A SHORT DISTANCE TO MASS; SOME EVEN DIVIDE THE FAMILY TO PARTICIPATE AT DIFFERENT HOURS. FOR JEWS, THE LEISURELY WALK MARKS A DIVIDING LINE BETWEEN HECTIC LIFE COMMITMENTS AND A DAY OF ABUNDANT JOY AND ENRICHMENT. BEFORE WE BECAME AN AUTOMOBILE CULTURE, CATHOLICS EMBRACED A SIMILAR PACE, AND IN MOST PLACES WALKED TO CHURCH. THESE LOVELY DAYS OF FALL INVITE US TO TAP INTO AN OLD AND LIFE-GIVING TRADITION. IF YOU LIVE WITHIN A MILE OF YOUR CHURCH, WALK NEXT WEEK. IF YOU MUST DRIVE, PARK AT A GOOD DISTANCE AND WALK THE REST OF THE WAY. TALK ABOUT YOUR LIFE, GREET STRANGERS, NOTICE THE CRUNCH OF LEAVES UNDER YOUR SHOES. YOU MAY BE SURPRISED AT HOW DIFFERENT SUNDAY MASS FEELS WHEN IT IS FRAMED BY LEISURE!



#### What is an Annulment?

Marriage is a sacred vocation and one of the seven sacraments in our Catholic faith. Catholics understand marriage to be an indissoluble union. Sometimes though, marriages come to an end. While the Catholic Church does not recognize divorce, it does recognize that sometimes marriages are not actually valid. To address this question of validity, the Church has an annulment process. The Diocese of Phoenix's Office of Canonical Services and the Tribunal defines annulment as "an investigation into whether or not the bond of marriage was formed at the time of consent" (Source: Pastoral Instruction and Policy on Marriage, 2023). The Office of Canonical Services and the Tribunal leads petitioners (those seeking annulments) through the annulment process with the assistance of nullity ministers—designated parish staff and volunteers trained to accompany petitioners and sometimes respondents.

On Saturday, October 25th, the Diocese of Phoenix's Office of Canonical Services and the Tribunal will host an annual annulment information seminar. Anyone who needs or might need to enter the annulment process, and anyone interested in learning more about annulments is encouraged to attend. Please see the graphic below for more information.
